• Your eligibility is determined through the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) or the WASFA (for HB 1079 students). Open to students in most programs of study, however those with bachelor degrees may not be eligible for grants.

• Timeline: Apply early! Priority for some grants is given to students who complete their financial aid application process by the early application deadline.

HOW TO ENROLL

A. ELIGIBILITY

Shoreline Community College welcomes high school graduates and adults 18 years of age or older to enroll. High school students may take college classes with written approval of a school official. NOTE: These requirements do not apply to students taking only Continuing Education non-credit classes.

STEP 1: GETTING STARTED www.shoreline.edu/currentstudents. then select registration.

STEP 2: LOG IN

Log in with your Student Identification Number (SID) and your Personal Identification Number (PIN).

PIN numbers are your six-digit birthdate until you change it. Go to **https://wts.shoreline.edu/webreg/waci221.html**.

STEP 3: WELCOME!

The Registration page gives you an overview of the Registration system, tuition payment deadlines, and link to the current class schedule. Click REGISTER at the top of the page.

STEP 4: SCHEDULE

Using the class schedule, you are now ready to select your classes. The **ITEM NUMBER** is the key identifier for each class that you wish to **ADD**, **DROP**, or **CHANGE**.

AUTOMATIC WAITLISTS NOTE: Some courses are set up to activate an automatic waitlist when they are filled. If one of these classes is full when you attempt to register, you will be given the option of being placed on the waitlist. You will be automatically registered if space becomes available. It is the student's responsibility to be aware of their position on waitlisted classes and to resolve scheduling conflicts within the college's established add/drop time limits. Waitlisted students should plan to attend class the first three days of the quarter or until it is determined if space will become available.

E. TUITION & FEE INFORMATION

Payment of Tuition and Fees

Tuition and fees are due within 5 business days of registration or by the first day of the quarter, whichever is first. Students who do not pay by the appropriate date above may be withdrawn from classes for nonpayment of tuition and fees.

Tuition may be paid online (www.shoreline.edu/apply-and-aid/cashiering/ payment-methods.aspx), in person at the Cashier, or after-hours in the drop-box located next to the Safety and Security Office. Payment methods accepted are cash, check, Visa, or MasterCard. Payment with American Express and Discover Card is available online only. Credit cards may also be used to pay by phoning (206) 546-7850. Do not deposit cash in the after-hours drop-box.

Residency

For tuition purposes, a state resident is one who is a U.S. citizen or who has permanent resident immigrant status, refugee-parolee status, or conditional entrant status, and

1) has established domicile (residence) in the state of Washington primarily for purposes other than educational for the period of one year immediately prior to the first day of the quarter and was financially independent from parents or legally appointed guardians for the calendar year during which college enrollment begins, or

2) is a financially dependent student, one or both of whose parents or legal guardians have maintained domicile in the state of Washington for at least one year immediately before the first day of the quarter.

TIM Note: Typically, state residents document their legal residence in Washington by showing that for the entire 12 months immediately preceding the beginning of the quarter, they have done all of the following: 1) held a Washington driver's license or identification card

- 2) had their vehicle registered in Washington
- 3) been registered to vote in Washington and

4) have not enrolled for more than six credits at SCC.

A student wishing to change his or her residency classification must petition the college by completing the residency questionnaire obtainable online and by providing necessary documentation such as above. This should be done before the day of registration.

State Support of Higher Education Students

Pursuant to RCW 28B.76.300 and RCW 28B.15.0681, the approximate level of state support received by students is being provided to the colleges for your use. Amounts in the table below represent an average for full-time equivalent, lower division resident student attending community and technical colleges for the academic year 2019-2020.

The average cost to educate a resident full-time community or technical college student for the 2019-2020 academic year is \$9,565. Students pay an average of \$3,269 in tuition toward this cost. The remaining \$6,296 is an "opportunity pathway" provided by the State and is funded by state taxes and other sources. The amounts shown are averages for a full-time, resident student. The actual tuition a student pays will vary due to credit load, residency status, and other factors.

STUDENT TECHNOLOGY FEE:

An additional \$4.40 per credit fee (\$44 maximum) has been approved by Student Government to support technology for students. This fee is calculated into your total charges.

STUDENT UNION RENOVATION FEE:

An additional \$4.40 per credit fee (maximum \$52.80 per student) has been approved by Student Government to fund the renovation of the Student Union Building.

STUDENT COMPLETION FEE:

An additional \$0.50 per credit up to 10 credits (includes graduation fee and two transcripts).

SUSTAINABLE COMMUTER OPTIONS FEE:

Approved by student election, this \$34.00 fee funds multiple service improvements to the campus such as increased bicycle rack access, parking improvements and reduced bus pass costs.

REFUNDING OF TUITION AND FEES:

Refund of tuition and fees is made to students withdrawing from regular classes as follows:

• In Person:

By 4 p.m. April 10, 2020: **100% refund** except for fees listed in the schedule of fees as non-refundable.

• Online:

By 10:00 p.m. April 10, 2020: **100% refund** except for fees listed in the schedule of fees as non-refundable.

• By April 27, 2020: 50% refund.

There will be no refunds after April 27, 2020.**

**Refund policy may differ for shortened or late-starting classes.

Please contact Enrollment Services for more information.

Refunds of less than \$10 will not be issued. However, this balance may be applied to future quarters. Any balance remaining after spring quarter of each academic year will be forfeited.

To qualify for a refund, students must officialy withdraw from classes. Stop payments on checks do not qualify as withdrawal notices. For information about official withdrawal and refunds, please visit www.shoreline.edu/es.

When a student's enrollment status changes after class begins, that student has until the 5th day of the quarter, April 10, 2020, to submit a written request to the Financial Aid Office asking that his or her financial aid be adjusted. Students who receive financial aid and either withdraw from all their classes OR do not complete any credits might have to repay some of the financial aid. More information is available in the Financial Aid Office.

NOTE: All Continuing Education courses are scheduled on a self-support basis and are not financed by state tax funds. When classes must be cancelled because of low enrollment or some extenuating circumstance, we will call you prior to the start of the class. In this case, a refund will automatically be processed for you. Should you withdraw from a class for which you have already registered, you must do so 48 hours before the first class meeting in order to receive a refund.

Grades: Grades for Spring Quarter will be available beginning June 24, 2020. Grades can be accessed at: www.shoreline.edu or in person on campus. Grades are NOT mailed.

F. ADD/DROP PROCESS & TRANSCRIPTS

Transcripts

Two official transcripts are provided free of charge, thereafter copies are \$5 for each copy up to a maximum of 10 copies per order. There is a \$30 fee for international delivery. Expedited processing is available by request for a fee of \$20. Requests may also be made online at: www.getmytranscript. com. Allow 3-5 business days for processing.

Adding and Dropping Classes

FEE: After April 19, 2020 a \$15 service charge will be charged for each add/drop schedule transaction.

DROPS: Through April 19, 2020 : Will not show on student record, but regular withdrawal procedures must be followed.

April 20-May 9, 2020: Will show as "W" on student record. Instructor's signature required.

After May 9, 2020: Instructor may assign a "V," or "NC," or "Z," which will appear on record.

ADDS: Through April 10, 2020: No signature required except for full or special permission classes.

April 13-17, 2020: Requires Late Enrollment Petiton and the signature of instructor and division chair.

Online registration is available through April 10, 2020.

Spring Quarter classes cannot be added after January 14, 2020, except

in rare and unusual circumstances with a Petition for Late Enrollment.

Students who have been attending classes but are not registered will not be permitted to register after April 10, 2020 except for classes specially designated late starting or continuous enrollment, or re-registering following drop for non-payment. Late enrollment petition required after April 10, 2020.

NOTICE OF CHECK DISHONOR:

You will be notified by mail if your tuition check is rejected for payment by the bank it was drawn on, and returned to the college. Payment of your current outstanding tuition including a service charge of \$25 must be received by the Cashier's Office located in the 5000 building by the due date specified on the mailed notification. Failure to pay the outstanding tuition including service charge may result in full withdrawal of currently registered classes.

G. POLICIES & PROCEDURES

Title IV Student Complaint Process:

The Higher Education Act (HEA) prohibits an institution of higher education from engaging in a "substantial misrepresentation of the nature of its educational program, its financial charges, or the employability of its graduates." 20 U.S.C. §1094(c)(3)(A). Further, each State must have "a process to review and appropriately act on complaints concerning the institution including enforcing applicable State laws." 34 C.F.R. § 600.9. Student Records and Rights to Privacy

All students at Shoreline Community College are protected by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974. Your privacy is protected with certain restrictions on the disclosure of your student educational records and information. You have the following rights, protection, and privacy of your educational records at SCC.

1) The right to inspect and review your student education records within 45 days of the day the college receives a request for **access.** Students should submit a written request to the Registrar's Office identifying the records(s) they wish to inspect.

2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records the student believes are inaccurate.

3) The right to consent to disclosures of directory information contained in the student's educational records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

Disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests is an exception which permits disclosure without consent. A school official is a person employed by Shoreline Community College in an administrative, supervisory, academic or research, or support staff position (including security); a person or company with whom Shoreline Community College has contracted; a person serving on the Board of Trustees; or a student assisting another school official in performing her or her tasks.Volunteers and interns serving in any of these capacities are also considered school officials. Upon request, Shoreline Community College may disclose educational records without consent to officials of another school in which you are currently enrolled, receive services, or seek or intend to enroll. Shoreline Community College publishes and discloses directory information to various requestors. Directory information consists of name, telephone number, major field of study, dates of attendance and graduation, and degrees and awards received. If you choose not to have your directory

Student Policies

Policy 5030

The freedom to learn depends upon appropriate opportunities and conditions in the classroom, on the campus, and in the larger community. Students should exercise their freedom with responsibility. The responsibility to secure and to respect general conditions conducive to the freedom to learn is shared by all members of the College community. The following enumerated rights are guaranteed to each student within the limitations of statutory law and College policy which are deemed necessary to achieve the educational goals of the College: (1) Academic freedom and (2) Due process.

The College may impose disciplinary sanctions against a student who commits, attempts to commit, aids, abets, incites, encourages, or assists another person to commit, an act(s) of misconduct, which include, but are not limited to the following: (1) Academic dishonesty; (2) Other dishonesty; (3) Obstructive or disruptive conduct; (4) Assault, intimidation, harassment; (5) Cyber-misconduct; (6) Property violation; (7) Failure to comply with directive; (8) Weapons (except under certain circumstances); (9) Hazing; (10) Alcohol, drug, and tobacco violations; (11) Lewd conduct; (12) Discriminatory conduct; (13) Sexual misconduct; (14) Harassment; (15) Retaliation; (16) Misuse of electronic resources; (17) Unauthorized access; (18) Safety violations; (19) Violation of other laws or policies; and/ or (20) Ethical violation.

Possible disciplinary sanctions for violation of the student conduct code include: (1) Disciplinary warning; (2) Written reprimand; (3) Disciplinary probation; (4) Disciplinary suspension; or (5) Dismissal. Terms and conditions may be imposed alone or in conjunction with the imposition of a disciplinary sanction including, but not limited to, the following: (1) Restitution; (2) Professional evaluation; (3) Not in good standing; and/or (4) No contact order.


