Land Acknowledgement

Shoreline Community College acknowledges that we occupy the ancestral lands of the Coast Salish Peoples, in particular the Duwamish Tribe. We see you, respect your right to sovereignty and self-determination, and are committed to being better listeners, learners, and in lifting Indigenous voices. The College grounds served as a special place for gathering traditional foods in ways that increased the bounty of the land by both the Duwamish and Suquamish Tribes. The Suquamish used these lands with agreements by the Duwamish. Without the **Duwamish and Suquamish** Nations protecting and honoring all living and spiritual beings residing in these environments, the land would not be as bountiful as it is today. We are called to continue that stewardship as we write the next chapter of our College.

Dear Campus Community,

The 2023-2024 academic year at Shoreline Community College (Shoreline) was nothing short of a whirlwind—one filled with significant challenges and transformative opportunities. Through it all, our community grew stronger and more resilient, united by a shared commitment to supporting one another through any obstacle and fostering a positive, connected campus environment.

One of the year's most significant challenges came in the form of a ransomware incident that impacted several areas of the college. Much like the disruptions caused by COVID-19, this event forced us to adapt quickly, strategize effectively, and collaborate often with our stakeholders. Thanks to the talent and dedication of our faculty and staff, we developed new protections and practices to safeguard our campus and ensure we could continue to move forward. It was a true testament to the strength of our Shoreline team.

This year also brought a follow-up accreditation visit to address areas the commission had previously identified as being out of compliance or requiring improvement. While these kinds of changes often take years to implement, our college community tackled the challenge with determination and focus. Together, we made substantial changes to our structure and practices, leading to measurable improvements and resulting in a great deal of positive feedback from the accreditation commission. Their commendations were a meaningful validation of our hard work and progress.

Another remarkable milestone was the development of our new equity-based strategic plan. This comprehensive plan reflects our dedication to reducing equity gaps, improving student achievement, and fostering a stronger sense of belonging across our campus. Grounded in data and intentional strategies, this plan represents our commitment to building a more inclusive and supportive community for all.

These achievements were made possible by prioritizing meaningful relationshipbuilding-both within the college and with our community partners. Some highlights include collaboration with the Muckleshoot Tribal School, Meaningful Movies Tacoma, the United Seattle Korean School, and the College for International Development (CCID) as well as partnerships with institutions like Amazon, Washington State University Everett, North Seattle College, Shoreline School District, Bellevue College, the Abu Dhabi Education Knowledge Department (ADEK), and many more. We've strengthened our connections locally, regionally, and globally. On campus, we've also seen increased engagement with our Foundation, campus events, and initiatives aimed at serving our students and the broader community.

While there is still much work to be done, this year has shown us the incredible potential of our college community. By keeping our focus on students and their success, we've proven that together, we can overcome any challenge and achieve remarkable outcomes.



COLLEGE MILESTONES

A Home Run for Student Success

In 2023, Shoreline Community College (Shoreline) was selected as a recipient of the Major League Baseball (MLB) All-Star Legacy Initiative. This partnership, with MLB, the Seattle Mariners, and United Way of King County's "Bridge to Finish" program, revitalized Shoreline's Benefits Hub to better serve students facing financial hardships.

The Benefits Hub now features an upgraded food pantry stocked with healthy options, a redesigned hygiene station, and essentials like clothing, toiletries, and kitchen tools—all aimed at removing barriers to education. Last year, Shoreline's Benefits Hub supported 453 students through over 4,000 interventions, with 76% identifying as students of color and 42% as parents.

Student Kiara Romba, an immigrant from Ivory Coast and the first in her family to attend college, credited the Hub with transforming her educational journey. "It's not just a name—it's hope, peace, and security for students navigating life's challenges," she shared.

Shoreline's Multicultural Speaker Series: Elevating Voices and Building Connections

This year, Shoreline Community College launched its Multicultural Speaker Series, a testament to the College's commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion. Designed to elevate underrepresented voices and foster connection, the series brings together students, faculty, staff, and the community to engage in meaningful dialogue and reflection.

The inagural lineup funded in part by the SCC Foundation, included Peter Bacho, an author and educator who illuminated the history of "Pinoy Seattle" and AAPI resistance; Tim Wise, a renowned anti-racist educator who tackled the challenges facing Critical Race Theory and anti-racist education; and Matika Wilbur, a celebrated photographer who deconstructed Native American stereotypes through art.

The series was created by Nicole Buyagawan, a tenure-track American Ethnic Studies faculty and Acting VP of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Ernest Johnson, as a way to create spaces where BIPOC individuals can feel seen an empowered. Reflecting on the impact of the series Nicole shared, "It's powerful to have a chance to share experiences and emotions with your peers, with your community, and then be able to reflect on and work on it together. We don't always have a lot of opportunities to have those experiences, so this series was a way to create that here on campus."

By creating spaces for connection and dialogue, the Multicultural Speaker Series is helping to build a stronger, more inclusive Shoreline community.

Shoreline Launches First Bachelor's Program to Meet Healthcare Needs

This summer, Shoreline Community College proudly launched a Bachelor of Applied Science in Dental Hygiene (BASDH). This is the first bachelor's degree of its kind for Shoreline. Addressing a national shortage of dental hygienists, particularly in underserved rural areas of Washington State, this program expands upon Shoreline's stellar associate degree in dental hygiene.

"This program is directly at the heart of our mission," said Dr. Lucas Rucks, Acting Vice President of Instruction for the 23-24 school year. "We are using data to inform decisions, leveraging employer feedback, and putting out high-quality graduates to serve our communities exactly where they are needed most." With 119 credits over eight quarters, the BASDH maintains the program's rigorous standards while offering new pathways for students.

Launching in summer 2024, the program will admit 20 students in its first cohort, furthering Shoreline's mission of workforce development and addressing critical healthcare needs.

Cedar Building: Honoring Indigenous Heritage at Shoreline

Shoreline Community College's new Cedar building reflects its commitment to honoring the cultural heritage of the Pacific Northwest's Indigenous Peoples. Named after the Western Red Cedar, xəpayac in Lushootseed, the tree symbolizes resilience and connection for local tribes. The name was chosen in collaboration with the Tulalip and Muckleshoot tribes, with guidance from Lushootseed Language Educator Eliise Bill-Gerrish, who ensured the process respected tribal languages and traditions.

"This is just the beginning of a continuous effort to strengthen relationships with the tribes and respect the cultural significance of the land we occupy," said Dr. Jack Kahn, President of Shoreline Community College. "We know there is still much work to be done to acknowledge and serve our Indigenous communities, but we are excited about fostering meaningful and ongoing collaboration."

The associated Student Government also played a key role, advocating for Indigenous representation and making the largest donation to the project. Now open for instruction, the Cedar building houses programs like chemistry, biotech, manufacturing, phlebotomy, and many more!

Shoreline Community College Foundation Annual Report of Activities and Support 2023-2024

We believe that affordable education and training makes our community stronger. We believe that everybody should have access to a quality education. We believe that donors can change the world.

The Shoreline Community College (SCC) Foundation is dedicated to increasing student access and success through raising funds, building partnerships, and advocating for students and the college. We do this work with the help of generous donors. Each year hundreds of individuals, corporations, and foundations provide funds to benefit SCC students and programs.

Scholarship & Direct Student Support Awards

The SCC Foundation awards annual and quarterly scholarships to students for tuition, fees, books and supplies.

These donor-funded scholarships are evaluated for merit and financial need. A committee comprised of SCC faculty, staff, and volunteers evaluated 805 scholarship applications during the 23/24 academic year which resulted in:

233 Scholarship Awards totaling \$276,489



\$207,764
174 students received financial assistance to help cover tuition and fees



\$68,725
46 students received funding for books and supplies



13 students were awarded funding for program internships

Financial assistance is also made available to SCC students who are dealing with financial hardship resulting from an emergency, accident, or other unexpected incident that has a direct impact on their academic success. Using a mix of donor funding and a grant through the United Way of King County, SCC students can find help through our Campus Benefits Hub.



In Fall 2022, a survey, conducted by Western Washington University in partnership with the Washington Student Achievement Council, revealed that nearly half of students at 39 colleges in Washington State face basic needs insecurity. The statistics are alarming:



Campus Art Gallery Receptions and Exhibits

The Campus Art Gallery provides a space for the campus and broader community to share a regular schedule of art and art- ists, including exhibits featuring Coastal Salish artist Andrea Wilbur-Sigo, and SCC's very own Parisa Ghaderi.



Girl Scout STEM Day

This was SCC's first ever Girl Scout STEM Exploration Day, bringing 96 scouts to campus for hands-on learning in automotive, manufacturing, biology, biotech, computer science, and physics.



Giving Table Luncheon: November 3, 2023

The SCC Foundation's annual fundraising luncheon brought 275 donors and community members together to raise funds in support of SCC Students and programs.

During academic year 23/24 the SCC Foundation provided funding for projects that align with the College's mission and strategic plan. This financial support ranged from \$300 - \$10,000 for ongoing pro-grams as well as one-time projects for students, faculty and staff. But for too many students in our community, this is a devastating reality.

In Washington, the numbers speak for themselves:

4 out of 10

students experienced food insecurity in the last month.

3 out of 10

students faced housing insecurity in the last year.

1 out of 10

students experienced homelessness in the last year.

From Shoreline to Scientific Journal: **Honors College Student Bokai Zhang Publishes First Article**

Shoreline's Honors College offers a unique experience, particularly through its yearlong research track. Open to second-year students, the 10-credit program guides participants through independent research projects. In fall, students select a topic and dive into peer-reviewed articles, interviews, and historical research. Winter focuses on mentorship, with faculty guiding students through literature reviews and preparing them to present at the University of Washington (UW) Undergraduate Research Symposium. Spring emphasizes presentation skills, with opportunities to share findings on campus or at UW. When asked about the impact of the program, Interim Director of the Honors College Michael Overa, a deeply passionate advocate of program said "these students make me optimistic for the future."

Last year, Honors student Bokai Zhang became the first to publish in a scientific journal. Coauthoring with biology professor Leonid Gines a paper titled "Analysis of Cancer-Resisting Evolutionary Adaptations in Wild Animals and Applications for Human Oncology" that was featured in the Journal of Molecular Evolution. The paper explored Peto's Paradox, analyzing why large animals like whales and elephants are less prone to cancer and investigating its implications for human oncology. Zhang, now at BYU pursuing pre-med, exemplifies the program's commitment to providing students with a one-of-a-kind experience in a community college setting. "I'm grateful to have had this experience, because it helped me build a solid foundation in scientific research, and opens doors for future opportunities," said Zhang about his work on this project.



Celebrating Shoreline's 2024 All-Washington Academic Team Members

Calm Under Fire: How Esther Lim-Hinton Kept MLT Moving Forward

In May 2023, an accidental fire broke out in Shoreline Community College's 2600 Building, displacing critical Medical Laboratory Technology (MLT) labs, but Program Director Esther Lim-Hinton rose to the occasion with ingenuity and determination. Despite losing essential equipment and lab space, Lim-Hinton quickly found creative solutions to keep her students moving forward.

Lim-Hinton secured temporary lab spaces, worked with community partners, and utilized virtual simulation tools to provide hands-on learning. "I did the best I possibly could with my students," she says. "Having a smaller class during that time turned out to be a blessing in disguise."

While rebuilding the program, Lim-Hinton also re-launched a long-awaited Phlebotomy Certificate Program in spring 2024 and supported new faculty. A Navy veteran, Esther credits her military training for her ability to navigate chaos. "In the military I did really well when there was trauma or chaos because I can make fast, calm decisions and I can see things through, which has been very helpful."

Through extraordinary challenges, Lim-Hinton's dedication to her students and unwavering commitment to the MLT program exemplify the resilience of Shoreline's community. Her leadership not only ensured the program's continuity but also laid the groundwork for future growth, inspiring her colleagues and students alike to persevere in the face of obstacles.



RASHAWN SMITH

Driving Success in Automotive Education

Rashawn Smith, instructor for Shoreline's Honda PACT program, is transforming how students prepare for automotive careers. Originally from New York with no automotive background, Rashawn discovered his passion after fixing a broken cable in his own Honda Accord. He graduated from Shoreline's General Service Technician program in 2013, became a Honda and Acura Master Mechanic, and achieved ASE Master Mechanic certification.

Since joining Shoreline as an instructor in 2021, Smith has tripled graduation rates by developing individualized training models, enhancing mentorship opportunities, and strengthening curriculum. His graduates excel at dealerships nationwide and maintain strong ties to the program.

In August 2024, Rashawn received the prestigious "Challenging Spirit Award" from American Honda for his innovative teaching methods, which have improved technician retention nationwide.

"What I'm doing is benefitting my students in their development," says Smith. "In automotive, we look at every single one of our students as part of a brand, or part of a family. If we aren't setting them up for success, we're setting our family up for failure."

Through his passion and commitment, Rashawn is building a community of thriving automotive professionals who support each other and inspire future students.

RUNNING START MATH PILOT

Running Start Math Pilot Prepares High School Students for College Success

This year, Shoreline Community College piloted an innovative Running Start Math program, developed by math faculty member Steven Bogart in collaboration with local high school instructors. Research shows that many students are reticent to attend college because the requirement of a college level math course can be a huge barrier. This program was designed to help high school students prepare for Math 107: Math in Society, a college-level course that fulfills a key graduation requirement, before they even begin their degree, thus opening doors for some potential students that might otherwise have remained shut.

Through the pilot, 59 students from Shorewood and Shorecrest High Schools participated in a high school class that incorporated elements of Shoreline's Math 47 (Intermediate Algebra Support) curriculum. Math 47 is a corequisite for Math 107. This approach gave students an early introduction to college-level material while

allowing them to build skills and confidence with the support of their high school teachers. Then in the spring of 24' the students enrolled in Math 107 while still receiving help from their high school instructors in addition to their college professor.

"This is another innovative way that our STEM faculty are being creative and meeting students where they are," said Dalila Paredes, Acting Dean of STEM. "It highlights Shoreline's ability to make meaningful partnerships and relationships with local high schools."

The Running Start Math Pilot is an example of Shoreline's commitment to removing barriers, adapting to the changing needs of today's students, and fostering academic success. Using data from the first pilot to inform future decisions, plans are underway to refine the program and offer it again for the spring 2025 quarter.

CAPTAIN LINDA FORST

Educating the Next Generation of Law Enforcement


For over two decades, Dr. Linda Forst has brought real-world expertise to Shoreline Community College's Criminal Justice program. A retired police captain from Boca Raton, Florida, she has dedicated her career to training the next generation of law enforcement professionals, ensuring they see beyond the headlines and television dramas.

During her police career, she served as a field training officer and Crimes Against Persons investigator, and held roles in hiring, internal affairs, and support services as she rose through the ranks. She served as Watch Commander on the midnight shift for five years, acting as the highest-ranking officer on duty at night. Her career culminated in a three-year post as Uniform Operations Commander, leading 100 personnel across patrol, traffic, special operations, bike and marine units, K-9 teams, and other specialty divisions.

Dr. Forst is also a nationally recognized author. She co-authored *An Introduction to Policing*, one of the top five policing textbooks in the country, now in its 10th edition. Her journey with the book began when she was invited to contribute by fellow author, Jack Dempsey, but initially declined, as she was just starting her teaching career at Shoreline. By the third edition, she joined the project, bringing a much-needed female practitioner's perspective. The textbook is updated every three years to reflect shifts in law enforcement, including advancements in technology and the evolving role of police officers.

Passionate about education, Dr. Forst challenges her students to think critically about policing and its impact on society. "I want them to go beyond the headlines," she says. "To truly understand law enforcement, they need to dig deeper."

With her deep experience in the field and commitment to student success, Captain Forst continues to shape the future of criminal justice professionals—one class at a time.



PAUL HERRICK

Shaping Thinkers One Book at a Time

Dr. Paul Herrick began teaching at Shoreline Community College over three decades ago, and over that time he has become a vital contributor to the College's Philosophy Department, inspiring students to think critically and engage in meaningful intellectual inquiry.

His passion for philosophy began in an unconventional way. After dropping out of college, he spent some time working in commercial fishing out of his hometown of Ketchikan, Alaska, as well as in trucking along the West Coast. During those years, he found himself consistently pondering life's biggest questions. Seeking answers, he turned to philosophy books at the library, a journey that ultimately led him back to college and into a lifelong academic career.

A prolific author, Herrick has written six textbooks on symbolic logic, critical thinking, and philosophy, published by renowned presses including Oxford University Press and the University of Notre Dame Press. His latest book, *Christian Apologetics and Philosophy: An Introduction*, was released by Notre Dame in 2024. Currently, he has three additional works under review, covering Plato, Descartes, and medieval philosophy.

Beyond writing, Dr. Herrick thrives on the intellectual exchange that teaching provides. "I love the give and take with students, debating issues, and learning from them as they learn from me," he says. His textbooks, widely used in classrooms across the country, have sparked discussions with fellow educators who share their experiences, enriching his own teaching.




FACULTY SPEAKER
